What YOU can do to embrace, enhance, and share our liturgical singing

As a member of the Body of Christ	
SING – every chance you get!	Dust off folk songs, church hymns – anything worthwhile – then bring your singing voice to church
LISTEN to those around you	Practice singing <i>together</i> , matching pitch and tempo, and blending your voices to the glory of God
LEARN our liturgy and chant	When you have questions, ask your priest or cantor! Memorize common hymns.
COMMIT chants to memory	Start with the basics. It's easier than you think – you know many of them already
LIVE the liturgy	Come to church to share in singing and fellowship, and discover the liturgical year

As a cantor – all those things, plus the following:	
LEARN everything you can	The cantor should be able to teach others, especially children: explore our services and chants and find out how they "work"
PREPARE for each and every service	Walk through the service you are about to lead so that is flows as a seamless prayer to God
BE SURE to welcome newcomers	Our chant is participatory – beauty and faith-filled worship are not optional!
RAISE UP assistants / successors	Look for others to sing with you at the kliros
LEAD clearly and with love	Set the melody, pitch and tempo – then (if possible) back off and let them sing!

In every parish:	
ASSESS the singing as it is today	What is working well? What could be improved? Make a plan and try something (more or fewer melodies or services)
WRITE a history of your parish singing	Every parish has something unique to share: cantors, choirs, melodies, recordings
UNITE opposites	Alternate men and women, adults and children, clergy & people
Hold a parish singing workshop	Whether encouraging the quiet to sing, explaining our liturgy and chant, or teaching everyone to sing in harmony.
