Our holy father Gregory of Nyssa, brother of St. Basil the Great, one of the great theologians of the Byzantine Church. (c.395)



Lamplighting Psalms in the Tone of the Week (Tone 7, p. 92), stichera 10-7.


Cantor: (Tone 8) If you, O Lord, should mark our guilt, Lord, who would survive?

You were giv-en wit-ness from on high by the de-scent of the Spir - it;
 and the voice of the Father testi-fied that you are his Son. Now man-i - fest
 your-self to us and grant in - cor - rup - tion to our souls.

Cantor: Let the watchman count on daybreak,
(on 4) and Israel on the Lord.

O Lord, from all e - ter - ni - ty, you were be-got - ten in an unchangeable way from the
 Fa - ther. In lat - ter times you came and received the likeness of a serv - ant.
 As the Cre - a - tor you al-so re-newed our like - ness, for in your baptism you
 grant - ed in - cor - rup - tion to our souls.

Cantor: *(Tone 5)* Because with the Lord there is mercy and fullness of redemption,
(on 3) Israel indeed he will redeem from all its iniquity.

Aposticha doxastikon of the postfeast - Tone 4 samohlasen




The One who clothes himself with light as with a robe deigned, for our sakes, to
